

Non-Escalation Exposure Reality Check

A bounded first-pass check for examining whether an escalation route could still affect one decision pathway before the outcome became operational.

Could the route still change what happened next?

PURPOSE

Use this resource on one concrete AI-assisted decision route. It helps separate a documented escalation channel from a route that remained actionable, connected to authority and capable of influencing the outcome. It does not provide a score, certification or diagnostic conclusion.

Use one route, not the whole organisation

The check is strongest when the decision, concern, reviewer, escalation path and operational effect are all bounded.

01**Select one route**

Choose a consequential AI-assisted pathway with a definable reviewer and operational outcome.

02**Use surviving evidence**

Prefer records, interface captures, timestamps, tickets, messages, workflow states and role documents.

03**Mark uncertainty**

Use Unclear where the record cannot support a conclusion. Do not fill gaps with assumptions.

04**Write a narrative result**

Describe what was actionable, what remained nominal and what evidence is still missing. Do not score the route.

DECISION OR OPERATIONAL OUTCOME

What decision, closure, hold, rejection, prioritisation or action is being examined?

AI-ASSISTED INFLUENCE

What output, ranking, classification, recommendation, framing or routing condition influenced the pathway?

REVIEWER AND ESCALATION ROUTE

Who reviewed the case, and where was the concern expected to go?

OPERATIONAL EFFECT

When did the route become active, communicated, closed or difficult to reverse?

BOUNDARY

This resource does not determine whether a case should have been escalated, assess compliance, assign responsibility, validate the control environment or establish the severity of any exposure. It is an educational first-pass tool for examining one route.

Concern and trigger visibility

Could the reviewer identify the concern and understand when escalation was expected?

1. Can the concern or inconsistency that first justified attention be identified from contemporaneous evidence?					
2. Is it clear when the concern first became visible to the reviewer or responsible function?					
3. Could the reviewer access enough case-level evidence to understand the concern rather than only record it?					
4. Was the escalation trigger understandable within the workflow actually being used?					
5. Can the record distinguish “no material concern” from “the concern was not visible or not recognised”?

Practical actionability

What could an ordinary reviewer actually do when the concern first appeared?

2. Was escalation accessible through a practical route rather than an exceptional or disconnected process?					
3. Did initiating escalation suspend the pathway, or could the original workflow continue automatically?					
4. Could the reviewer act without disproportionate forms, repeated justification, personal influence or organisational risk?					
5. Were viable alternatives still available beyond accepting or rejecting the option already presented?

Destination and authority

Where did the concern go, and could the recipient affect the route?

1. Was the actual escalation destination identifiable to an ordinary reviewer at the relevant moment?					
2. Could the receiving person or function access the evidence needed to understand the case?					
3. Did the recipient hold authority to pause, redirect, reopen or otherwise alter the decision pathway?					
4. Were ownership, expected response and route continuation clear while the escalation was open?					
5. Can the organisation identify who finally decided whether the route should continue and on what authority?

Timing and outcome changeability

Did the escalation remain connected to the decision while ordinary intervention was still effective?

Record attributable times or periods. Use Unclear where the surviving evidence does not preserve the event.

5. Can the organisation distinguish the time of concern, initiation, response, commitment and operational effect?

Non-escalation and handoff continuity

What does the absence of escalation mean, and did signal, evidence, authority and timing remain connected?

Where no escalation occurred

Mark the explanation supported by contemporaneous evidence. More than one condition may apply.

☐ No material trigger was present

☐ The concern was resolved within local authority

☐ A reasoned decision not to escalate was recorded

☐ The trigger was not recognised or not visible

☐ The route appeared slow, unclear or futile

☐ The record does not explain non-escalation

1. Did the concern, supporting evidence and decision context travel with the escalation or handoff?					
2. Did the receiving function know the urgency and the point at which ordinary intervention would cease to be effective?

4. Did the original workflow remain connected to the escalation, rather than continuing independently?					
5. Can the route be reconstructed without relying solely on later interviews or hindsight?					

EVIDENCE CUES handoff record | attachments or evidence links | urgency marker | workflow status | response and continuation record

SECTION OBSERVATION

Write the result as a bounded narrative

Do not convert this worksheet into a score. State what the surviving evidence can support, what requires inference and what remains unknown.

OBSERVED ROUTE CONDITION

Describe whether escalation was actionable, nominal, delayed, disconnected or insufficiently evidenced.

WHAT THE EVIDENCE SUPPORTS

Identify the strongest attributable evidence about concern, available action, destination, authority, timing and continuation.

WHAT REMAINS UNCLEAR

Record missing timestamps, absent workflow states, uncertain authority, incomplete handoffs or unexplained non-escalation.

IMMEDIATE INTERNAL FOLLOW-UP

State the smallest proportionate action: preserve evidence, clarify ownership, test pause capability, review one sample or document the route.

When a bounded review may be appropriate

Where one consequential route remains materially unclear after this first-pass review, the public progression is: Operational resource → Pre-Diagnostic Intake → Scope Review. A Scope Review determines whether a bounded Exposure Diagnostic is appropriate; it does not follow automatically from uncertainty in this worksheet.
